The Chairman, Secretary and Councillors went through the items listed in Annex 24 of the Agenda & Annexes for the 88th FIDE Congress Executive Board and these Minutes should be read in conjunction with that Annex 24.

Main points:

Chairman explained the main point of our mission, using chess as a tool for educational purposes - "chess for education" not "education for chess" - by showing some slides from his recent presentations. Ministries and other educational organizations are not very receptive to being 'sold' chess. Far better to give them a solution to an educational problem. Perhaps the main problem that school curricula have is how to teach the three higher-order thinking skills of Bloom's taxonomy. The three lower-order thinking skills are more than adequately covered by the normal curriculum subjects. The three higher-order skills are: analysis, evaluation and creation. Anyone in the chess world will recognize that these three skills are precisely what is at the core of chess.

Several budget lines produced greater than expected income. The most important being the School Instructor Title and especially the collaboration with FEDA/FIBDA. Seminars at the end of 2016 (titles being ratified in 2017) produced both seminar income and 56 new SI title holders. FEDA/FIBDA organized our first ever online Docente+SI course (ONL-1) in August in Spanish language which produced 29 new title holders (to be confirmed by EB or next PB) almost all from seven South American countries. FEDA/FIBDA also ran two Docente+SI seminars earlier this month in Corrientes (ARG-1) and Buenos Aires (ARG-2) with another 35 SI titles to be approved by EB or next PB. See Results annexed hereto.

The Commission approved all the additional clarifications (as per item 3 of Annex 24) to bring our existing regulations in line with our online SI course.

The FIDE School Chess Leader Diploma and Early Years Skills Program (eys.fide.com) were briefly discussed. FSCL is due online by the end of the year while the EYS site with its 53 videos and sub-titles in four languages has been online since the spring.

The remaining points in Annex 24 were all approved.

The question of University Research (stemming from a discussion of the EYS Program) led to interesting points from Mr Waithe (an approach to the University of West Indies), Ms Johnson (attempts to get chess introduced as an elective subject in the training of school teachers in the Teaching Academies of Trinidad & Tobago) and Dr Jordan (Rostock and Halle University, the latter having taught 400 school teachers).

Mr Hassan thanked CIS for the boards and sets received by Somalia (in the period when we had funds to provide them) but we no longer have any financial possibility to send more physical boards, sets, or demonstration boards. In any case, sending boards and sets is fraught with logistical problems (as we discovered in 2011-2014 when a substantial quantity of those we sent were lost in customs). Our current support for Federations is by way of our free online materials, which any interested party can download and use. These include the Planet Chess series, three books by Turkey's Dr Olgun Kulaç and much more.

Chairman described the 1-2-3 scoring system (see cis.fide.com) which is strongly recommended for school chess because it is highly motivational, ensuring that no player will score zero while making no difference to overall placement when compared with the traditional 0-1/2-1. Mr Escafre pointed out that this system is accepted by the Rules Commission.

Mr Kostyev made a presentation about the Belaya Ladya tournament, to which teams from across the world are invited with all expenses (except travel) paid by the organizers. More information from the RCF web site.

On the proposal of Mr Wastell the body unanimously agreed that the CiS Commission really ought to have an increased budget because not only does CiS develop more players, it is also one of the commissions that generates increasing income for FIDE;

CiS Council agreed to appoint member Jose Francisco ('Pep') Suarez Roa, the principal man behind the fruitful FEDA/FIBDA collaboration, as a Councillor to the Commission in place of another who had not been very active. Ben Chui was added as member.

Chairman Kevin O'Connell closed the meeting at 17.00 thanking all participants.
